## A Casino in the Lower Don Valley

### Will the benefits be at the cost of the Tinsley Community?

In the last few weeks the local papers have been full of articles about proposals to build Regional Casinos in the East End. It looks like there will be eight of these casinos built in Britain with a possibility Sheffield will be selected as one of the sites. In the East End it will be between the Sun International at Don Valley Stadium and MGM Mirage at Meadowhall

This potentially has important implications for the health and well-being of people living in the East End of Sheffield.

#### Health implications

Gambling is a leisure activity that is harmless for the majority of participants. However, for a minority of individuals gambling can have serious adverse consequences for the gambler and those around him/her.

The expansion in the opportunity and access to gambling is expected to increase gambling turnover by 50%, with an attendant rise in the number of regular gamblers and problem gamblers. The size of the increase in problem gambling is hotly debated.

Whether a regional casino will have positive consequences in terms of regeneration and



employment. depends on the potential negative effects casinos would have on local leisure facilities and restaurants.

However, there are significant risks that any benefits identified will be at the cost of local communities like Tinsley:

Casinos will result in increased levels of traffic in the Tinsley area already affected by poor air quality, resulting in increased air pollution and noise that will affect the local community's health and wellbeing. The majority of increased traffic flow will occur from tea time and continue into the early hours of the morning

Ease of access to gambling opportunities is a significant risk factor in problem gambling. The Parliamentary Select Committee report recommended that these casinos should not, as far as possible, be sited in close proximity to residen-

tial properties.

There is a risk of disproportionately increasing gambling among those least able to afford it, due to locating in the East End. Many of the jobs created will be relatively low paid, low skilled, service related jobs.

Employment in the gaming area of casinos is culturally inappropriate to those in the local population who are Muslim. There is a risk of locating a casino in the proposed sites increasing the relative disadvantage of this group.

We have highlighted some of the issues that might affect Tinsley residents. What do you think? Tinsley Forum will be discussing this issue at a meeting in the New Year.

# Life is getting better in Tinsley

## Says Tinsley SureStart Survey

**2**05 people, mostly women, took part in the Tinsley Sure Start User Satisfaction Survey conducted jointly during June-September 2004 by Tinsley Sure Start and the East End Quality of Life Initiative. From the 2 main ethnic groups in Tinsley, almost three-quarters of the people who took part were Pakistani, and 18% were White-British. Their average age was 29-30. Most were in good health, and health generally seemed to have improved since the first survey was undertaken 3 years ago.

### Tinsley as a place to live

Levels of satisfaction with Tinsley as a place to live had increased a great deal between 2001 and 2004. In the second survey, a lower proportion of people had lived in Tinsley a long time, perhaps indicating that some of those people who had been very dissatisfied in 2001 had moved away in the intervening 3 years. However, this alone would not account for the huge shift in satisfaction with all the different aspects of the area we asked about.

More than half the people in our survey said they liked the "friendly people" in Tinsley, and over 50% said that Tinsley had improved in the last 2 years. Comparing the 2 surveys, satisfaction (those who said they were fairly or very satisfied) increased with:

- \* general appearance of the area (from 22% to 62%)
- \* quality of education in local schools (from 58% to 71%)
- \* access to training (from 35% to 74%)
- \* availability of jobs for local people (from 13% to 53%)
- \* public transport to where you want to get to (from 51% to 75%)
- \* quality of local shops (from 47% to 74%).

### What would make Tinsley a better place to live?

85 people made comments about many aspects of life in Tinsley. Most comments, as in 2001, were about improving the local recreation ground. This was closely followed by people who wanted improvements to the maintenance of the area, especially street and subway cleaning. A youth centre and more activities for young people in the area were suggested by a number of people; more shops, increased police presence and a local police station, improved public transport, more sports and leisure activities, more activities in school holidays, and safe play areas for children were also suggested.

## Local Jobs for Local People at Green Business Network

**A**s previously advertised in the Tinsley Tribune, Green Business Network were looking to recruit local people for vacancies they had coming up at their new state of the art recycling company on Shepcote Lane. As part of their commitment they had offered Tinsley Residents with a CLAIT level one qualification a guaranteed interview.

Since 2002 111 people have completed a CLAIT qualification at Tinsley One Stop Shop. 12 of these qualifications were completed on a fast track intensive course held at Tinsley One Stop Shop in April in preparation for the forthcoming vacancies at Green Business Network.

After a few unforeseen delays application forms for all vacancies were available to Tinsley residents in October. Posters were displayed throughout the community and assistance with completing application forms was offered by Tinsley Forum and Sheffield Futures staff.

After a slow start Green Business Network agreed to extend the closing date to 8<sup>th</sup> November. 14 local people completed application forms and Green Business Network agreed to interview all candidates.

Shop on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> November and Thursday 11<sup>th</sup> November 2004 and were conducted by senior members of staff from Green Business Network. A total of 11 people were interviewed and 5 people were offered jobs. Positions ranged from Plant Operatives to apprenticeships.

Due to the success of this recruitment

initiative Green Business Network will be looking to work with Tinsley Forum and residents to recruit additional staff for vacancies which they have coming up in the new year.

### Air Quality and Health the evidence grows

There is a growing amount of evidence to suggest that more effective measures should be taken to reduce people's exposure to air pollution and noise attributable to road traffic and thus reduce their risk of disease and mortality due to cardiovascular, respiratory, and other symptoms.

The World Health Organisation recently said:

*"While recognizing the need for further research, current knowledge about the health effects of air pollution is sufficient for a strong recommendation to reduce children's current exposure to air pollutants, in particular to the pollutants related to traffic. The experts who conducted this review consider that such reductions in levels of air pollution will lead to considerable children's health benefits."*

Evidence from both Britain and North America suggests that the most deprived communities experience the worst environmental degradation.
